I would like to encourage us to make the Empowered Woman Luncheon an annual event to celebrate women who are leaders and innovators, while supporting our local scholarship efforts. As we move into election season, I encourage all of you to check out AAUW California's website at http://www.aauw-ca.org and click on the Public Policy tab. You will find information on the statewide propositions which AAUW CA has studied as part of its Public Policy program.

Briefly, AAUW - CA supports:

Proposition 47: Criminal Sentences. Misdemeanor Penalties. Initiative Statute.

AAUW - CA opposes:

Proposition 45: Healthcare Insurance. Rate Changes. Initiative Statute.

Proposition 46: Drug and Alcohol Testing of Doctors. Medical Negligence Lawsuits. Initiative Statute.

AAUW - CA is neutral on:

Proposition 2: State Budget. Budget Stabilization Account. Legislative Constitutional Amendment.

AAUW - CA did not study **Proposition 48**: Indian Gaming Compacts. Referendum, because it is not related to the AAUW CA Public Policy Priorities.

There is much more information on the AAUW - CA website about these ballot propositions, why AAUW - CA has taken the positions it has, and about the election process in general.

At the local level, we are proud to be co-sponsoring two forums with the League of Women Voters of Santa Barbara, as outlined on the cover page. I hope you will come to both of these events.

IGNITING THE SPARK: TECH TREK STEM CAMPS FOR GIRLS

SUMMARY OF SURVEY FINDINGS

Since 1998, AAUW has helped change girls' lives through Tech Trek, an experiential summer camp designed to pique the interest of rising eighth-grade girls in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). A 2013 survey of Tech Trek alumnae who attended the camp in California between 2006 and 2009 demonstrates the program's lasting effects on many levels, including interest and confidence in STEM fields, decision to pursue STEM curricula, and future career plans.

Interest and Confidence in STEM

A majority of alumnae surveyed believe that Tech Trek increased their interest in science (94 percent), technology (77 percent), mathematics (70 percent), engineering (52 percent), and computer programming (44 percent).

Increased self-confidence was another hugely important result.

91%

of girls reported that Tech Trek boosted their self-confidence in their ability to be successful in science classes, and 78 percent said the same for math classes.



Tech Trek operates on the belief that learning and achieving come from applying oneself rather than from an inborn predisposition. The camp builds a set of values and skills that equip girls to be persistent learners in any sphere and work hard to reach their goals. For many girls, the camp experience provides the life-altering "spark" that ignites their interest and encourages them on a path toward success.

Tech Trek was a life-changing experience for me. It sparked my passion for science and math and gave me the confidence to pursue advanced classes and research opportunities. I honestly don't think I would be where I am today without Tech Trek.

Decision to Pursue STEM Curricula

Thirty-two percent of respondents said they went on to participate in after-school or extracurricular STEM activities during high school, and many started, led, or joined STEM-focused clubs. Others volunteered for or competed in STEM-related activities.

Students commented on the unique value of their one-on-one experiences at Tech Trek as distinct from what they did at school. Many remembered the camp's creative approach through "eye-opening," hands-on activities.

82% of girls chose to take more science classes in high school because of Tech Trek.

"The short time I spent at Tech Trek gave me the confidence to do what I love by taking advanced math and science courses," said one respondent, who went on to major in biology and neuroscience.

Tech Trek alumnae surpass the national average in most advanced math and science courses:

GIRLS WHO COMPLETED PRECALCULUS IN 2009



87%

of respondents had completed algebra II, compared with 78 percent of female students and 73 percent of male students nationally.

The majority (73 percent) of respondents were enrolled in four-year college or university programs and expected to graduate within four years from the time of the survey, and 23 percent were attending two-year colleges.

Career Plans

Alumnae credit Tech Trek's multifaceted teaching and learning strategies with positively shaping their expectations and expanding their scope of opportunities in STEM.

After seeing, hearing, and working alongside women scientists and mathematicians during camp, many alumnae say they are less susceptible to negative stereotyping about women in STEM and more determined to achieve in whatever career interests them

87%

of respondents said Tech Trek introduced them to new STEM careers.

73%

of respondents said Tech Trek introduced them to STEM college majors of which they were previously unaware.





Summary

Tech Trek opens up STEM possibilities for girls in many contexts. It expands and influences their academic and social lives, starting in middle school and continuing on into their careers. The program seeks out talented girls, sparks their interest, illuminates the value of a college education, and validates their passions. Tech Trek's exciting, hands-on approach offers a wide variety of experiences that translate into options well beyond the week of camp.

One thing that particularly struck many of us in the audience was that when they introduced themselves, they referred to themselves as having been "a chemist at Tech Trek" or "an Alternative Energy Specialist at Tech Trek" rather than just saying "Chemistry was my core class." It showed that they had truly embraced the philosophy of Tech Trek, and they saw themselves as scientists, mathematicians, or engineers.

Our Branch should be proud of enabling so many deserving young women to have such a life-changing experience.

A grateful Tech Trek mother took time to write us to express how impressed she was with the camp. Here are the aspects of the camp that earned her particular praise:

"The science material was challenging. When it is challenging, it feels worthwhile, worth pursuing in the future...

Staff selection was very good. The women seemed interesting and likable...

The girls were assigned to roommates and groups with kids new to them...That's a smart move given possible social dynamics.

My daughter very much looked forward to and enjoyed spending the week in a dorm. ..

Each of the steps for applying to camp and carrying out the complex projects were learning experiences, and show at a practical level how science projects can play out."

Reason to Celebrate!

The 20th Anniversary of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) was celebrated last month. We have Sen. Orrin Hatch and then-Sen. Joe Biden to thank for this groundbreaking bipartisan legislation, which expands protections for women across the country. On the heels of VAWA's anniversary, the White House announced the "It's On Us" campaign against campus sexual violence. AAUW is a proud official partner of this effort.

Two New Resources from AAUW

The AAUW Action Fund Congressional Voting Record (CVR) for the 113th Congress is now available online! This voting record provides information about senators' and representatives' votes and cosponsorship on AAUW issues, including economic security, budget and appropriations, education, and civil rights. Hard copies of the CVR are on their way – you can be one of the first AAUW members to get copies of this voter education resource by pre-ordering it via the upcoming policy events form, or sending an e-mail to VoterEd@aauw.org. This week, AAUW released our annual analysis of the gender pay gap by congressional district. The analysis includes a fact sheet for each state with that state's wage gap and the wage gap for each congressional district. Plus, we rank each congressional district from smallest gap to largest. Cheers to Emma Watson for Her Speech to the UN

United Nations Women Goodwill Ambassador Emma Watson gave a <u>speech</u> at the United Nations Headquarters that challenged men and boys to become advocates for gender equality. "We want to end gender inequality – and to do that we need everyone to be involved," Watson said. She also said we must stop equating feminism with man-hating because feminism is the "belief that men and women should have equal rights and opportunities." Watson's speech kicked off the "HeforShe" <u>campaign</u>, a solidarity movement for gender equality.

Later this month our Outings Interest Group will take an excursion to the Carpinteria Salt Marsh Nature Park. This is a natural treasure in our own back yard that few of us have explored.
