Lauren Amery Named 2014 Winner of Branch Scholarship

The Scholarship Committee is pleased to report gifts totaling \$2,595.00 due to efforts by our members in recent months of 2014. Approximately \$2,000 was received from 16 of our members, who responded generously to our May letter. Donations were also received from a former member, and in memory of a former member. Thanks to Claire VanBlaricum who donated her handmade glass centerpieces and glass jewelry, \$805 was added to our fund. These creative pieces were sold at our May luncheon and by Jane Honikman at the AAUW convention.

For the 2014 Dr. Lynne Cavazos Fellowship, we had applicants from each of the credential programs at UCSB: Elementary Education, Secondary Education and Special Education. The selection committee read the applications and unanimously determined that Lauren Amery (Elementary Education) was the best candidate for this award.

In her application essay, Lauren wrote, "A large part of my teaching philosophy is igniting children's natural curiosity and my lessons are often designed for students to ask and explore 'why' questions. She also wrote, "I have planned many collaborative projects with my students. My goal for them is learning that everyone has something unique they bring into the classroom and everyone has their own strengths. I also want them to persevere through their work to find creative solutions to problems. I am setting up this environment by reading to the class Rosie Revere, Engineer by Andrea Beaty. It is about a young girl who wants to be an engineer and learns through her failed projects. Through this story I am asking my students what Rosie does when she's failed at something and if they think failing can be a good thing. I love reading this book to my class because it has a strong female main character who is excelling in a typical male subject of engineering. It also teaches the students that failing can often lead to important learning experiences."

One member of the selection committee remarked, "In her teaching, she shows initiative and creativity in helping girls discover their strengths." Additional remarks include, "... Lauren will be a model teacher and supporter of equity for girls and women... " Another member of the selection committee commented, "She specifically addresses how she is promoting equity and access for females and I appreciate her thoughtful explanation of the books and projects she is using with her students."

Lauren is a Santa Barbara native, having attended Roosevelt Elementary, SBJHS and SBHS. She then attended UC Berkeley where she majored in public policy and focused on education and family policy. She studied different policies in the United States that help single women with their children and education equality. Looking outside of the United States, she also studied women's rights in refugee camps.

Thanks to all of you who gave your time, your talents, and your treasure to support this worthy effort.



In the late 60's she and her psychiatrist husband moved to California while pregnant with the first of their two daughters. Except for three years in Topeka, Kansas, the family has been in California (San Diego). In April of this year, Diane and her husband (married 50 years) decided to move to Santa Barbara to be near their daughter and her family which includes their three grandchildren.

Diane and her husband love to travel and have been to over 150 countries. Her favorite, besides England, is Indonesia. They prefer learning to leisure vacations and have been to exotic locales such as Antarctica, Easter Island, Papua New Guinea and Tibet.

MEET OUR PRESIDENT---CLAIRE VANBLARICUM

Claire was born in Oak Park, Illinois on August 21st. As a very young girl, she wanted to own an Arabian horse ranch and train horses. However, she went to Pomona College in Claremont, CA where she majored in Botany/Biology with a minor in German. Her favorite subjects were Plant Ecology and Mycology (study of fungi). She received her secondary teaching credential from San Diego State College (now University).

She moved to La Mesa, CA between the fourth and fifth grades. She came to Santa Barbara in 1969 just after completing her teaching credential to start a teaching job at Carpinteria High School. From 1969 through 1978, she taught Life Science, college prep Biology, Physical Science, Earth Science and General Science.

She has been married to her husband Glenn for 42 years and they have one son, Jim, who is single and lived in New York for 9 years but has recently moved to Los Angeles. Claire states "no grandkids yet, just two grand cats!"

After Jim was born, Claire did volunteer work as a docent at the Natural History Museum for several years. She then worked as Administrator/Executive Director of Alexander House Foundation (a local charity that makes housing grants to needy senior citizens) for about five years. In 1994, she was elected to the Santa Barbara School Board and served two terms.

Claire loves to travel and her favorite city is Paris and favorite country is Australia. She and Glenn love to cruise but for land travel they

prefer to plan their own itineraries, activities and schedules with the help of their travel agent.

Some of Claire's favorite things are Italian food, cooking, reading, knitting and making fused glass jewelry and plates. Since she is a voracious reader, she does not have one favorite book. She really enjoys a well written mystery by Tony Hillerman, Marcia Muller or Michael Connelly but also reads nonfiction, especially

Local Girls Have a Ball at Tech Trek

Twenty six girls sponsored by SB-GV AAUW reported to one of two Tech Trek camp sessions at UCSB, eagerly anticipating the action-packed week ahead. Come hear about their experiences at our Ice Cream Social on September 14. Thanks again to the many organizations and individuals who made their scholarships possible.

Once again, our branch provided great support to the Tech Trek camp directors. Jean Reiche prepared a dinner for the camp staff the evening before the first day. We had three of our members helping with each of the two registration days and our branch members helped recruit 6 women who work in STEM fields to participate in each of the camp's two Career Nights. The women included forensic scientists, doctors, a flight nurse, water-systems managers from the city as well as scientists from both industry and academia.

For this coming year, we hope to send 28 girls. Thanks to the fund raising efforts of Beverly Kowalsky Ching, and the support of our members, we are confident we can reach that goal.

Please enjoy the following excerpts from the "Thank You" notes we received from our campers this year!

"At my school, most girls do not care about academics and think it is pointless to be smart. Here at Tech Trek, girls are like me and I feel like I belong."

"My overall favorite thing was going to the Nano Lab.... l loved every nanosecond of my camp."

"One of the things that makes this camp so enjoyable is all the junior counselors, dorm moms and teachers. They all know how to make you laugh and smile. They were weird (in a good way)."

"We learned never to fear failure"

"I enjoyed working in a team. It showed that a group of people who work for something they want to accomplish can do it if they all work hard."

"I thought I wouldn't learn how to build a bridge out of thin spaghetti. This was really fun and held a <u>lot</u> more weight than I thought."

"I was particularly intrigued by solar cells and how they transfer light from the sun to create electricity."

"Chemistry is so interesting. We got to do very cool experiments, such as finding out whether water is sticky."

"When we went out on the Condor Express, we dredged up marine samples from the water. My favorite station was the Hold Fast Dissection stations because I enjoyed looking through the seaweed roots to find little marine animals such as brittle stars or sea urchins"

"Who knew physics class could be so much fun?"

"I loved the food!"

"Thank you for helping me attend this amazing camp"

As a special Summer Event, on Saturday morning, August 2, some of our branch members took a wonderful guided nature walk on More Mesa with a docent from the More Mesa Preservation Coalition, Valerie Olson. We heard the fascinating history of the approximately 250 acre site, including a scandal involving bribery of public officials in the 1980s by those wanting to develop the area into luxury homesites! We saw several varied habitat areas: grassland, oak woodland, coastal scrub, vernal pools (now dry, but wait until it rains!), as well as cottonwood groves and non-native eucalyptus groves and fields of fennel. We saw two white tailed kites hovering as they hunted, but unfortunately the overcast cool conditions seemed to be keeping all the other birds and butterflies in hiding!

While we were on this walk, the idea of forming an "Outings" interest group developed,. Kathy Crevier and Jane Honikman stepped up to head the group and have been brainstorming some ideas of other local adventures for our branch. Keep an eye on your email for a outing in September!
