"Catching Shrimp with Bare Hands" The Story Behind the Story Special Presentation by author and branch member Michelle Robin La Thursday, July 23, 2015 at 4 pm Goleta Library Community Room 500 North Fairview, Goleta

Michelle Robin La's first book, Catching Shrimp with Bare Hands: A Boy from the Mekong Delta, is the true story of her husband, Lurong La, growing up in the midst of the Vietnam War and his struggle for freedom after the Communist takeover. When the 1968 Tet Offensive forces Lurong's family to flee the countryside for the safety of the city, his mother continues to travel back and forth to their island farm despite threats from the Việt Cộng and nearby firefights. Lurong only wants to catch fish and slingshot birds, but the war ends and Communism plunges their country back in time to a land without electricity or fuel where books are burned and propaganda "kneads their brains." He starts to fight for his freedom the only way he knows how.

Celebrating the 43rd Anniversary of Title IX

This Tuesday, June 23, marked the 43rd anniversary of Title IX. AAUW celebrated in style with a wellattended bipartisan reception on Capitol Hill. Staffers representing the offices of 45 Members of Congress and House and Senate committee offices, 25 advocacy and civil rights organizations, AAUW members and supporters of Title IX gathered to celebrate AAUW's Lobby Corps 40 years of activism on behalf of gender equity in education. Senator Hirono spoke about her personal relationship with Rep. Patsy Mink, who motivated her as the first woman of color in Congress and a fierce advocate for women's rights. Leader Nancy Pelosi also said a few words at the reception, toasting AAUW for being "persistently, excellently there" in support of women since 1881 and noting the efforts of AAUW Lobby Corps. have put in every Thursday for the past 40 years.

Lisa Maatz, Vice President of AAUW Government Relations, reminded all in attendance that our work to implement Title IX continues. She released a letter from the National Coalition for Women and Girls which lists gender equity amendments to the Every Child Achieves Act which the Senate will vote on in a few weeks.

As a young woman one year away from finishing her college career, I cannot help but look back at my time in school and realize how grateful I am for the work of Patsy Mink to get Title IX passed. I played sports throughout my K-12 career. It was not until high school that I began to hear stories from my mother and aunts about their inability to play sports.

Now that I am an intern at AAUW I am working to educate people that Title IX not only affects women in sports, but does so much more. For example, Title IX enforcement includes preventing sexual harassment and violence which the Supreme Court has recognized as extreme forms of sex discrimination covered by Title IX. We as a nation are finally beginning to understand sexual assault on college campuses as a prominent issue, and realize that students in these situations need to know their rights. Thanks to Title IX, I feel more empowered to continue in the fight to end sexual assault on campus, and the fight to protect survivors of assault who simply want to get an education.

AAUW Lobby Corps Marks 40 Years of Successes

In 2015, Lobby Corps celebrates 40 years of successes in advancing legislation to empower women and girls. It all began in 1973, when AAUW took the step to register as a federal lobbyist, thus forming the Capitol Hill Lobby Corps. This kind of group was a first for AAUW, and the inaugural team (which began lobbying in 1975) boasted 29 members from branches in the Washington metro area.

Over the past 40 years, Lobby Corps members have continued to flex their political muscle as volunteer citizen activists, spurring action around issues like economic security, education, and civil rights. One of the group's first victories was a bill to provide divorced women with legal access to a portion of their former spouses' pensions. Another critical victory came in 1993, when President Bill Clinton signed into law the Family and Medical Leave Act, legislation for which Lobby Corps had been pushing for seven years. Major successes also came in 2009 with the passage of the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act and in 2013 with the passage of the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act.
