Meet Our New Member—Deborah McGuire Castorino

She also wanted to write and started journaling in primary school. She created play books from other people's materials. Karl Storz Hosts Tech Trek Campers





To get a taste of industrial STEM careers, thirteen of last summer's Tech Trek campers recently toured the local facilities at Karl Storz Imaging, an international company that makes endoscopes and related equipment for medical imaging. The girls needed to wear lab coats and safety glasses for a tour of the factory floor, where Karl Storz makes some of its imaging devices. They also watched a 3-D printer create a prototype part that was demonstrated for them on the CAD software by one of the many female engineers at Karl Storz.

Where It All Started

AAUW of California member Marie Wolbach founded Tech Trek in 1998 with the help of an AAUW Community Action Grant. Since then, AAUW of California has grown Tech Trek to ten camps on eight college campuses across the state. A 2013 survey of Tech Trek alumnae who attended the camp in California between 2006 and 2009 demonstrates the program's lasting effects on many levels, including interest and confidence in STEM fields, decision to pursue STEM curricula, and future career plans.



Ending Sexual Violence on Campus

As you know, AAUW is deeply engaged in the conversations here in Washington about the best way to end sexual violence on campus. We led the charge to pass new provisions in the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act in 2013, which are now supported by regulations that went into effect in July. Schools are making important strides to improve their response to incidents of rape, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking.

Over the past few weeks we've seen some major policy shifts from groups who were supporting the Safe Campus Act, a bill AAUW opposes. The National Panhellenic Conference (NPC) and the North American Interfraternity Conference (NIC), national organizations representing some fraternities and sororities, withdrew their support for the Safe Campus Act, a troubling bill that would have made it more difficult for survivors to seek support and justice following an incident of campus sexual violence. AAUW led the development of a coalition letter to Congress, signed by 220 other organizations, in opposition to the Safe Campus Act. We understand that schools must have a role in responding to sexual violence because they are the only ones who can provide interim measures and accommodations for survivors, such as class schedule or housing changes. Furthermore, forcing a victim to pursue a criminal investigation before accessing the disciplinary processes on their campus – a requirement of the proposed Safe Campus Act, -- makes it more difficult for them to seek justice and conflates the goals of these two parallel paths.

AAUW applauds student fraternity and sorority members for speaking up and urging NPC and NIC to listen to survivors' concerns. Unfortunately, they have indicated they will continue to support the Fair Campus Act, another bill AAUW opposes that we believe will undermine the protections that Title IX provides to ensure every student receives an education free from sexual harassment and violence. We all need to work together to develop policies that will help end sexual violence on college campuses, provide the best tools for schools to respond, and help survivors to seek the justice they deserve. I know AAUW members are up to the challenge.

Smart Talk

Smart Talk has been meeting on the second and the fourth Mondays of the month. The October 12th meeting was a discussion of transgender youth and of sexual reassignment treatment starting at an early age. Subjects included issues of parenting, the question of whether children can make such permanent decisions at a very early age, and the peer relations of children who are 'different''.

October 26th's meeting took up issues around the Second Amendment; its origin in English common law, the political circumstances involved in its drafting, the definition of a "militia", the changing legal interpretations and the growth in the influence of the NRA. The acceptance of marriage equality was given as an example of the ability of public opinion to radically change and of the willingness of judiciary to follow that change. Reframing the conversation in this country from "gun rights" to "public health/harm prevention" might prove as useful in swaying public opinion as changing "the right to gay marriage" to "marriage equality".

The November 9th meeting concerned water in California. In a new procedure, members of the discussion group all read up on aspects of this broad topic that interested them, and then shared what they had learned. This process facilitated a multi-layered discussion, which touched on the history of water legislation, the causes and effects of the drought and new technology to address it, among other topics.



The next meeting will take place at the home of Claire VanBlaricum, 5026 Yaple Ave. at 7:00 p.m. on Monday, December 14th. The topic will be "Digital Devices: Their Impact on our Lives for Good and III". All are welcome. You can pick an aspect of the topic which interested you and come prepared to present it to the group or just come and jump into the discussion.

2015 was a banner year for AAUW—not only did we wrap up a fabulous National Convention in San Diego, we were also honored by two major associations for our outstanding communications.

For the third year in a row, the AAUW blog was recognized for its excellence by the Association Media and Publishing, receiving a silver Excel Award. But they didn't stop there. We also won a bronze redesign Excel Award for the new and much-improved Mission and Action e-newsletter and two editorial awards for single-topic magazine issues. The Winter 2014 issue of Outlook, which focused on LGBT rights, and the Fall 2014 reproductive rights issue were awarded bronze and silver, respectively.

In addition to the publishing awards, the Direct Marketing Association of Washington gave AAUW a bronze and silver MAXI Award for our member note cards. Every year, generous and talented AAUW member artists donate their work to be used on note cards that are then sent to every member with a call to support AAUW's mission and programs.
